# 2018 G20 ARGENTINIAN PRIORITIES (official) BUILDING CONSENSUS FOR FAIR AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

(Through the three pillars of diversity, people, and sustainable development)

#### **Key priorities**

#### 1. The future of work – unleash people's potential

- a. Emphasis on skills for life and work: adapt education systems and policies to prepare people for work and life in the 21<sup>st</sup> century
- b. Establish consensus on international education financing systems
- c. Develop dialogue on the effect of current and potential technological advances on the productivity, growth, job market, and economic equality of our economies.
- d. Prioritize the informal economy, job security, and social protections
- e. Close the gender gap

#### 2. Infrastructure for development – mobilize resources to reduce the infrastructure deficit.

- a. Promote inclusive growth
- b. Close the gap in infrastructure development
- c. Increase private sector involvement

#### 3. Sustainable food future – improve soil productivity by sustainable means

- a. Develop responsible land management techniques
- b. Feed the world with healthy foods via agricultural practices which are modern, competitive, and sustainable
- c. Implement the agricultural monitoring initiatives proposed during the French G20 presidency in 2011

#### **Additional thematic areas**

#### 1. Anti-corruption

- a. Establish legal and policy environments that promote a clean business environment
- b. Enhance international cooperation
- c. Develop and promote the implementation of preventive measures
- d. Cooperate with the business community (B20) and civil society (C20) to promote transparency and integrity
- e. Develop integrity in state owned enterprises
- f. Manage conflicts of interest

#### 2. International trade and investment

- a. Build an inclusive trade system that contributes to sustainable and shared growth
- b. Continue to integrate small and medium-sized enterprises in international trade
- c. Recognize opportunities presented by the digital economy

#### 3. **Development**

- a. Promote inclusive economic growth
- b. Invest in early childhood
- c. Improve habitat conditions promote long-term urban, peri-urban and rural development alongside environmental protection
- d. Facilitate inclusive business for all sectors of society

#### 4. Health

- a. Recognize dangers to economic stability from:
  - i. Antimicrobial resistance
  - ii. Financing of universal health coverage
  - iii. Pandemics

#### 5. Climate and energy

- a. Promote environmental sustainability with a focus on job creation and infrastructure development
- b. Project long-term low-emissions development (2050 and beyond)
- Align and mobilize climate finance flows for the implementation of Nationally Determined Contributions under the Paris Agreement (NDC's) and low-emission development strategies
- d. Establish energy grids that are more flexible, transparent, and clean
- e. Advance access to affordable energy in Latin America and the Caribbean
- f. Reduce inefficient subsidies to fossil fuels
- g. Improve transparency of information on energy, digitalization, and energy markets
